Malala Yousafza, who won the Nobel Peace Prize
by fighting for girl's education, was born in north-west
Pakistan, a place ruled by Taliban since 1996. Unlike us,
girls there were banned to go to school according to the
Taliban's order, but being in school was what Pakistani
girls looked forward to. Malala documented her strong
desire to return to school through an anonymous diary,
hoping to raise people's awareness of girls' education
rights. Later, Malala's article was published by BBC Urdu.

This rebellion of Malala soon drew attention from the army. One day on Malala's way home, a

Taliban gunman came to her school bus and asked all passengers one question, "who is Malala?" Owing to their fear, nobody took Malala's side. Then, Malala was identified, and she was shot in the head.

Out of pity, I draw this picture to rewrite the depressed outcome of this incident! If Malala's classmates had courageously said that "Malala did not come to school today", she would not have faced this life-threatening risk. Even though this shocking historical moment brought Malala international fame, the price she paid was too much. Being such an inspiring person, Malala does not need to suffer the agony of this brutal treasure.
